## The International Day of Prayer and Reflection against Human Trafficking.

The 7th International Day of Prayer and Reflection against Human Trafficking will be celebrated shortly. It is a day to remember, to pray together and to raise awareness that human trafficking is one of the most serious human rights violations of the 21st century.

In this year 2021, the day highlights one of the main causes of human trafficking - the dominant economic model, with its limits of suffering and contradictions are aggravated by the COVID-19 Pandemic virus.

But ...Why is this day celebrated on 8th February? It is because on the 8th of February 1947, Saint Josephine "Bakhita", a Canossa nun, was born. Pope Francis chose this day that Saint Bakhita may become a light in this dark reality.



And ... Who is "Josephine Bakhita"? She is

believed to have been born around 1869 in Sudan. She tells us in her autobiography: "I lived a very happy and carefree life, not knowing what suffering was." When she was 9 years old she was kidnapped, forced to walk 970 km, sold, purchased, even given away, tortured ... and made a slave. So who else can tell us something about this cruel reality called slavery in the 21st century? It is only she who can tell us about her true hope, true strength and the will to survive. Bakhita, not only endured so much cruelty and suffering every day of her life and the physical and psychological wounds that penetrated the depths of her heart and her dignity: yet did not allow it to take over her LIFE. From the experience of her suffering, she knew how to transform it into strength, hope, joy, desire to live,... making the meaning of the name, ironically given to her by her kidnappers, "Afortunada" (Bakhita) a reality.





It is paradoxical, but from a faith perspective, the experience and the life of this great woman and many women with whom we have shared our lives, helps us to understand the message of the Gospel where Jesus told us "unless the grain of wheat falls into the ground and dies... it does not bear fruit".



The fruit has been good and abundant. From the most human point of view sharing some of the journeys with people who have suffered from trafficking, getting close to their lives, to their suffering must arouse in us indignation, pain, impotence, rage... But if we look at them from the perspective of faith and dare to "look in-depth", I believe that seeds of hope, audacity, commitment, freedom... will sprout in us and around us.

THANK YOU! Milena, Joy, Ira, Carmenza, Charity, Elena, Irina... ...and a very long list of names and faces of so many women, men, girls and boys who

have suffered and still suffer the violation of their rights as persons. They have dared to transform their suffering from within into daily gestures of life and hope... We are questioned by their lives to have the possibility to change our reality a little bit more.

With these desires the UISG (International Union of Superiors General), Talitha Kum (the International Network of Consecrated Life against Human Trafficking) was born in 2009 in Rome. . It shared the desire to create a "network of networks" to coordinate and strengthen activities against human trafficking in the world. Talitha Kum is a network of networks that wants to unite human forces and resources. It is a network of consecrated women who instead of adding links to a chain that imprison, kindles a light to make this reality visible. They illuminate with dedication and commitment to the path to freedom along with the men who desire and seek every day. With the same goal, we raise our voices in unison: Arise! Sisters and brothers of our member congregations in 70 countries! Their lives are a sign of our times; they and we possess the gift of universality.

The Adorers family is part of this great project and, I dare to say it, the development of this great project and it could not be otherwise. By charism and mission, to celebrate this day to open interior space of welcoming and adoration, to listen and to visualize, the faces, names and surnames, of so many women and girls with whom every day we make our way of liberation and the journey from the darkness into the light.



The feast of St. Josephine Bakitha on 8th February reminds me of another date which is very significant in the Congregation, which is 6th February 1844. (And without taking away the prominence of this great woman), I think we can also remember St Maria Micaela, as her autobiography tells us: "Ignacia took Micaela to the hospital of St. John of God, where there was a ward for venereal diseases. The first visit took



place on 6th February 1844. She records the date. God was waiting for Micaela there. There she came to know the lives of some women, who had a profound impact on her and finding no other way to help them, she decided to open a house or shelter home where she could welcome them and teach them religion".

We all know that this experience is the beginning of what we are today. Like her, we join so many people who kindle a light of hope and seek a way out of slavery to freedom every day.

The present moment and our daily experience of women who are victims of trafficking from all over the world are revealing to us new forms of trafficking. We are well aware of the crisis caused by Covid-19 which shows us the economic model, the one that dominates our lives and one of the main causes of human trafficking. Today we are invited to undertake changes, both individual and social, to transform our economic model, in which people are at the centre of all commercial and business activity, in which the economy is a means to help us grow and build citizenship in which there is no place for inequality, injustice or trafficking. # The area of Liberating Action of the Province of America participates in the Continental Campaign against Human Trafficking.

The Church and the Consecrated Life in Latin America and the Caribbean have been strengthening networking to respond to the realities of Migration and Trafficking in Persons. By the year 2021, it was proposed to carry out a permanent campaign throughout the continent in which the Church, communities and pastoral groups would reflect critically on Trafficking in Persons in the light of faith.

The organisers of the whole campaign are the CLAMOR network of the Latin American Episcopal Conference (CELAM) and the Confederation of Religious of Latin America and the Caribbean (CLAR), networks in which the Area of Liberating Action participates actively.



The opening took place virtually, on the night of February 7, 2021, the eve of the memory of St. Josefa Bakhita, with a ceremony where the presidents of CELAM, Clamor network, CLAR and Caritas intervened, Then began the central act, the prayer vigil, with Eucharistic presence that was present for more than an hour, animated by motivations, reflections of the reality in the light of the word and songs that were giving rhythm to the prayerful moment

having participation of voices from Mexico to Argentina, surpassing more than 7,000 people on social networks.

The active participation of the local communities of Adorers in the vigil was overwhelming, from all the countries joined in with such interest that it was a profound moment of prayer and of projection of our Eucharistic spirituality with all the other congregations, pastoral ministries, parishes and faith groups. From now on, the campaign will continue to generate actions and activities for the whole continent until the month of September, closing with the World Day of Migrants.





#### Provincial Chapters in Kolkata and Mumbay.

The two Adorers provinces of India have elected their provincial superiors for the next three years.

The Provincial Chapter of Kolkata has elected Sister Lissiamma Joseph as Provincial Superior, while Sr. Lissiamma Thuruthikara is the new Provincial Superior of Mumbai.

After the 8th General Conference, the Adorers' provinces had their Provincial Chapters in the various districts. The two Chapters in India, Kolkata and Mumbai, concluded on February 28th.

## Today we interview ...



## World Day for Consecrated Life. We interviewed Sister Gladys Herbas, junior sister of the Adorers.



P. Pope Francis said "The Year of Consecrated Life challenges us about our fidelity to the mission entrusted to us. Do our ministries, our works, our presences respond to what the Spirit has asked of our founders, are they adequate to address their purpose in society and in the Church today?" What do you see as the role of consecrated women in today's society?

R. These times demand coherence from us. Fidelity to the Mission entrusted to us requires us to give answers, that our presence expresses concrete attitudes of closeness and empathy, commitment to those most in need, to be generous with our gaze, listening and companionship.

Our Adorers' presence, the projects that we accompany, far from enclosing us and making us comfortable, demand that we renew ourselves, that we allow ourselves to be animated by the Spirit who animated St. Maria Micaela. Our Congregation tries to respond to the new realities that arise and cry out for liberation. We offer to the

Church and society our Mission of Adoration - Liberation, accompanied by committed lay people who share the charism and enrich the Mission.

I am convinced today more than ever that the role of the consecrated person is to transmit hope, to announce the Good News, to do so with simple gestures and attitudes that humanize and liberate, from the encounter with the other, the empathetic gaze and attentive listening. We are bearers of a great richness that is Faith and this is to be shared.

#### P. In your opinion, what do you think are the main challenges facing consecrated women in today's world?

R. I think that we are mainly faced with the challenge of giving meaning and transmitting to the world the vitality of our Consecration, making our choice of life in Chastity, Poverty and Obedience a Human Presence of God; being a sign of hope and transmitting the joy of the Following of Christ. In these times where everything is fleeting and relationships tend to be superficial, another challenge is to live the value of fraternity and interculturality, overcoming the search for power that society presents us. We are called to grow in shared service, opening ourselves to the richness of the different charisms that God gives us.



## Today we interview ...



#### P. On a more personal level, how would you explain your vocational process to our readers?

R. My vocational process was, and is, an experience of great tenderness from our Good God, through the mediation of concrete people, of simple faith and great strength and fidelity. God was presenting and calling me through women who opened their hearts to me and allowed me to accompany them. I can say with joy that they did great works in me; they are the potters that God has given me, leading me to rediscover Jesus in the Eucharist, human and simple. From there I began a process of Liberation, opening myself and discovering my identity, my being an Adorer.

I began as a layperson; for many years, I shared my life with the Sisters and the girls. I was able to add my gifts, my creativity. I could give myself to service, have my work, my family, an active social life, my place in the world, but something was missing.

Jesus was calling me more and more every day, I tried to turn a deaf ear, but that was when I felt most loved. The call to follow Him, to consecrate my life as an Adorer, was very strong. I began discernment, a beautiful experience of listening to God and to myself. God blesses all paths, gives us the freedom to walk and although some difficulties arose, God has his times and finally, I surrendered.

A great and vital key is faith, God's gift, which sustains me and encourages me daily.

I had everything a 38-year-old person could need, but I lacked the fullness. I was very happy to give up everything; today I am happier consecrating my life to God for them. There are days that are hard, but the important thing is to keep our eyes on Jesus and to know that we belong to him. Discernment and decision are daily attitudes that help us to follow him.

#### P. What keys were vital in this process?

R. A big and vital key is faith, a gift from God, which sustains me and encourages me daily. The constant search for an encounter with God, with his Word and prayer, were and are pillars in the process.

Discernment and accompaniment were also vital, it was a process that demanded openness and transparency, with myself, with those who accompanied me and helped and taught me to walk. I consider of supreme importance the witness of dedication and fidelity of so many Sisters Adorers who, through their service, spoke to me about God and taught me the meaning of dedication.

It was very important to work on my personal history and to discover in it the passage of God, to reread it and to embrace it. Vital keys that allowed me to express and live with joy, trust and simplicity, the beautiful path of saying yes to God's call, a response that is certainly a daily one.

## Today we interview ...



#### P. I understand that Micaela's charism and mission had a lot to do with it?

R. The Adorer charism did its work in me, hand in hand with them, women who were vulnerable but very courageous, who taught me to see beyond appearances, who showed me Jesus, wounded and vulnerable, walking beside me. Charism is a gift that God gives and it is a grace that sustains.

Adoration, the source that drives us to love and serve, makes us go out to the peripheries that surround us, because we do not have to go so far to meet the life that cries out for liberation, it is simply opening the door of our homes.

I thank God for the gift of my vocation as Adorer, Handmaid of the Blessed Sacrament and of Charity.

Saint Maria Micaela, my great companion on the road, a daring woman who left everything for the love of God, is a testimony of life and an inspiration because she had everything and gave everything for love. She knew how to let herself be found by God and to embrace His Will, to let herself be transformed by God and to be faithful until the end of her life, expressing with her dedication her desire "I have only lived only for God and for them".

#### P. We are living through a period of vocational crisis in Europe and stagnation in other parts of the world. How can we face this reality?

R. This reality responds to the fact that our society presents other values, is afraid of long-term commitments, anxious for new experiences. The great solidarity that is emerging is perhaps a space of opportunity to face this scenario. To be creative and instruments of God is the proposal.

#### P. To conclude, we recall this year's motto "Consecrated life, parable of fraternity in a wounded world". What does this message evoke in you?

R. Consecrated life is called to walk with others. I would like to give thanks for the generosity of so many of our sisters and brothers who, day after day, give their lives for those most in need, especially in this time of pandemic; how many are those who, moved by the Spirit, have reinvented themselves, joining forces and risking their own lives to be Samaritans alongside their suffering brothers and sisters. I thank God for the gift of my vocation as Adorer, Handmaid of the Blessed Sacrament and of Charity, and a name full of life and meaning, which completes and drives my humanity.

Our prayer goes also for the victims of this pandemic COVID 19.
